



Police Training in Arizona – The Problem

- Requirement for continuing training
- Arizona does not have an effective means of providing online continuing training to police officers
- Is online learning an effective way to provide in-service training?
 - Can police officers learn online?



Purpose of the Study



Purpose of the study was to compare the effectiveness of an online presentation of the Domestic Violence Investigations course offered by the Phoenix, **Arizona Police** Department to a traditional, classroom based version of the same course

Research Design and Procedures


- Mixed methods research design
 - Quantitative demographics, online learning survey, preand post-test
 - Qualitative Interviews
- Quantitative Data Analysis
 - Descriptive Statistics
 - Inferential Statistics
 - Paired and Independent Samples t-test
 - ANOVA
 - Pearson Correlations
- Qualitative Data Analysis
 - Basic qualitative analysis using NVivo 12

Findings

- Sixty-one participants (QUAN) and six interviews
- Learning occurred in both training modes
- The online DVI course was an effective learning environment
- Quantitative and Qualitative data indicated a difference in effectiveness between the online and classroom sessions

Application to Practice

- Police officers want adult learning techniques
- Online learning is a viable option for agencies
- "Flipping the classroom"
- Potential to "flip" the police academy
